March is Women's History Month

2020 marks a significant year in our country's democracy. It's the 100th anniversary of the 19th Amendment securing women the right to vote. It's a presidential election year. It's this decade's census to determine distribution of government resources and representation.

Mendocino Women's Political Coalition (MWPC) celebrates our 37th Annual Women's History Gala on Sunday, March 1st. This year's theme is Valiant Women of the Vote.

The program includes music, spoken word including student contest selections and historical figures, and honoring local women who are selected this year.

It is also MWPC's only fundraising event of the year. With those funds we:

- Promote women in politics by local outreach, mentoring, leadership training and financial support
- Host candidate and other educational forums including with state and national representatives
- Conduct campaign trainings
- Donate to community organizations, causes and emergency relief funds

Our fundraising largely depends on the generosity of businesses and individuals who offer their goods and/or services for our Silent Auction/Drawing (something one person wins) and New Experiences (something a number of people can attend/do).

Our Guest Speaker

Fiona Ma, is the Treasurer of the State of California. Fiona Ma is California's 34th State Treasurer. She was elected on November 6, 2018 with more votes (7,825,587) than any other candidate for treasurer in the state's history. She is the first woman of color and the first woman Certified Public Accountant (CPA) elected to the position.

The State Treasurer's Office was created in the California Constitution in 1849. It provides financing for schools, roads, housing, recycling and waste management, hospitals, public facilities, and other crucial infrastructure projects that better the lives of residents. California is the world's fifth-largest economy and Treasurer Ma is the state's primary banker.

Her office processes more than \$2 trillion in payments within a typical year. She provides transparency and oversight for the government's investment portfolio and accounts, as well as for the state's surplus funds.

Treasurer Ma oversees an investment portfolio of more than \$102 billion, approximately \$20 billion of which are local government funds. She serves as agent for sale for all State bonds, and is trustee on over \$100 billion of outstanding debt.

Barbara Bristol

Barbara Bristol has been a lifelong fighter for equity and diversity. As a teacher she worked with "tough" students teaching them the importance of becoming a good citizens. As AAUW President she



helped the organization to raise money for girls to attend STEM classes at Stanford University and developed scholarships for reentering students and nursing students to attend Mendocino College. As a genre author, she has published 14 books.

Carrie Durkee

Carrie Durkee practices democratic citizenship by working in committees to establish County Measures and State Propositions that work for the

Common Good. As a member of the Grassroots Institute, she co-facilitates effective community workshops and forums teaching Self Government whereby We the People can progressively develop solutions to the economic and environmental challenges facing us today.

Jackeline Orozco

Jackeline Orozco has worked very hard to identify people in the Spanish speaking community who are eligible to vote. And then she is there to help people navigate the voting process -- not an easy task for non-English speakers from a country with a different voting system. Through the newspaper she co-edits, *Al Punto*, and the corresponding FaceBook page, Jackie brings people the information they need to participate fully in our community.

Val Muchowski will be given the Bella Abzug* Passion in Politics Award for 40 years training women to be involved in the political arena.



***Bella Abzug**

Bella Savitzky Abzug (July 24, 1920 March 31, 1998), nicknamed "Battling Bella", was an American lawyer, U.S. Representative, social activist and a leader of the Women's Movement. In 1971, Abzug joined other leading feminists such as Gloria Steinem, Shirley Chisholm, and Betty Friedan to found the National Women's Political Caucus.

In 1970, Abzug's first campaign slogan was, "This woman's place is in the House the House of Representatives." She was later appointed to co-chair the National Commission on the Observance of International Women's Year created by President Gerald Ford's executive order, presided over the 1977 National Women's Conference, and led President Jimmy Carter's National Advisory Commission for Women. Bella legislated Women's Equality Day.

Friends of the Hospital

As a member of **Friends of the Hospital**, I, with others, still haven't given up the fight for a woman's right to have her baby here on the coast.

Currently, we are gathering signatures of coastal folks to petition Partnership HealthCare of California (PHP), the Mendocino MediCal arm, to pay what it costs for an actual Labor & Delivery (L&D) birth, rather than the current negotiated fee much below the cost of delivering a baby. Because of this inadequate reimbursement, almost all hospitals lose money on L&D. Some close their L&D department (like they did in Willits) if there's another hospital close by; other more strategic or better run hospitals have departments that make so much money they can cover the losses of L&D.

Everyone wins if PHP increases its L&D payments: our community can be assured of safe births. It would mean additional income for MCDH/Adventist Health, and, in the long run, PHP saves costs for ambulance service/helicopters over the hill and a lifetime of caring for developmental and disabled children born compromised by not having coastal L&D services.

Labor & Delivery deserves to be a community service, not simply judged on whether or not it makes or loses money.
