We extend our deepest and heartfelt congratulations to President Joe Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris on their Inauguration today. When day comes we ask ourselves, where can we find light in this never-ending shade? conditions of man

And so we lift our gazes not to what stands between us but what stands before us We close the divide because we know, to put our future first, we must first put our differences aside We lay down our arms so we can reach out our arms to one another We seek harm to none and harmony for all Let the globe, if nothing else, say this is true: That even as we grieved, we grew That even as we hurt, we hoped That even as we tired, we tried That we'll forever be tied together, victorious Not because we will never again know defeat but because we will never again sow division Scripture tells us to envision that everyone shall sit under their own vine and fig tree And no one shall make them afraid If we're to live up to our own time Then victory won't lie in the blade But in all the bridges we've made That is the promise to glade The hill we climb If only we dare It's because being American is more than a pride we inherit, it's the past we step into and how we repair it We've seen a force that would shatter our nation rather than share it Would destroy our country if it meant delaying democracy

And this effort very nearly succeeded

But while democracy can be periodically delayed

it can never be permanently defeated

In this truth in this faith we trust For while we have our eyes on the future history has its eyes on us This is the era of just redemption We feared at its inception We did not feel prepared to be the heirs of such a terrifying hour but within it we found the power to author a new chapter To offer hope and laughter to ourselves So while once we asked. how could we possibly prevail over catastrophe? Now we assert How could catastrophe possibly prevail over us? We will not march back to what was but move to what shall be A country that is bruised but whole, benevolent but bold. fierce and free We will not be turned around or interrupted by intimidation because we know our inaction and inertia will be the inheritance of the next generation Our blunders become their burdens But one thing is certain: If we merge mercy with might, and might with right, then love becomes our legacy and change our children's birthright So let us leave behind a country better than the one we were left with Every breath from my bronze-pounded chest,

we will raise this wounded world into a wondrous one
We will rise from the gold-limbed hills of the west,
we will rise from the windswept northeast
where our forefathers first realized revolution
We will rise from the lake-rimmed cities of the midwestern
states,

we will rise from the sunbaked south
We will rebuild, reconcile and recover
and every known nook of our nation and
every corner called our country,
our people diverse and beautiful will emerge,
battered and beautiful
When day comes we step out of the shade,
aflame and unafraid
The new dawn blooms as we free it
For there is always light,
if only we're brave enough to see it
If only we're brave enough to be it

# Equal Rights Amendment

We are writing to share some very good news! On January 21, Rep. Jackie Speier (D-Calif.) introduced a Joint Resolution in the U.S. House of Representatives with bipartisan support of 200 co-sponsors, including Rep. Carolyn Maloney (D-N.Y.), to declare that three-fourths of the states have ratified the Equal Rights Amendment and deem it to be a part of the Constitution. The resolution would also remove the arbitrary timeline for ratification put into the preamble of the amendment by congressional opponents of the ERA. The next day, Senators Ben Cardin (D-Md.) and Lisa Murkowski (R-Alaska) introduced an identical Resolution in the Senate.

This means that after a decades long fight for equality, we are now on the verge of seeing the Equal Rights Amendment added to the U.S. Constitution.

Thanks to victories by feminist-supported candidates in the 2020 elections and in the recent run-off elections in Georgia, the U.S. Senate flipped from red to blue, the blue majority was sustained in the U.S. House, and Joe Biden and Kamala Harris were elected to the White House.

With these victories and the newly introduced House and Senate Joint Resolutions, Congress can now vote to, at last, ensure gender equality for all Americans.

As we write in the new Winter 2021 issue of Ms., the Biden-Harris administration "has already established its ambitious agenda for advancing women's rights." And both Biden and Harris have long supported the ERA.

Membership in Mendocino Women's Political Coalition is a bargain and a statement. You will be saying that you are committed to reproductive choice, equity and equality. Dues will run from September 2018 to September 2019

#### UN Commission on the Status of Women

Takes place 15 - 26 March 2021

This is a lot to take in but participating in the Forum is exhilarating just to be connected to other women around the world and learn from each other!

Over the two weeks of the Commission on the Status of Women, NGO CSW/NY (headquartered in NYC) organizes more than 500 events that inform, engage and inspire grassroots efforts and advocacy needed to empower women and girls.

Just a brief note: The UN Commissions do not make laws for member states (aka nations). The United Nations is an international organization founded in 1945 after the Second World War by 51 countries committed to maintaining international peace and security, developing friendly relations among nations and promoting social progress, better living standards and human rights. Accredited NGO representatives to the UN have opportunities to participate in UN Commission sessions, but member states' domestic laws are dealt with within their own nation.

The UN CSW 65 Official Sessions follow specific thematic working sessions with governmental delegations attending their sessions virtually some of which will be webcast on UNwebTV.

The NGO CSW Forum runs parallel to the official events occurring within the UN Headquarters. This provides civil society the opportunity to engage in the processes and events of CSW without ECOSOC-accreditation or a UN grounds pass.

Civil society is the collection of social organizations, formed voluntarily by citizens to advance shared goals or interests. This includes independent public policy research organizations, advocacy organizations, organizations that defend human rights and promote democracy, humanitarian organizations, private foundations and funds.
