#### Malia Cohen

Malia M. Cohen serves as a Member of the California State Board of Equalization (BOE), California's elected tax commission. She was elected to the BOE in November 2018, served as Chair in 2019, and is the first African-American woman to serve on the Board.

As the BOE Board Member for District 2, she represents 10 million constituents living in all or parts of 23 counties extending from Del Norte County in the north to Santa Barbara County in the south. In January 2019, her BOE Board Member colleagues unanimously selected her to serve as Chair of the Board.



A strong advocate for social justice and inclusion, Board
Member Cohen pledges to ensure that the views of all who come before the Board of
Equalization are considered carefully, with respect, civility, and courtesy. She further commits
to collaborate with her colleagues to guarantee that all the actions of the BOE are open,
transparent, and above reproach.

Prior to being elected to the Board of Equalization, Board Member Cohen served as President of the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco. She was first elected to the Board of Supervisors in 2010 and re-elected in 2014.

Previously, she served as a Commissioner of the San Francisco Employee Retirement System (SFERS), which manages a \$23 billion pension fund. As President of SFERS, she led efforts to divest from fossil fuels and thermal coal investments and moved \$100 million into a fossil fuel-free index fund.

Throughout her life, Board Member Cohen has fought for diversity and inclusion. She has championed policies and programs that protect public health, foster economic development, promote new affordable housing, and that create good jobs through protecting and expanding our manufacturing base.

She announced her candidacy for State Controller during the California Democratic Party (CDP) 2021 convention.

"I am running because I am committed to equity, empowerment, hope and opportunity for all Californians," Cohen said.





Since Virginia became the 38th state to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment on January 27, 2020, we've been waiting for the constitutionally mandated two-year waiting period to end. January 27, 2022 marks the end of that wait.

It's the day that every constitutional requirement has been met. It marks the day that the ERA should be officially published to the Constitution. But there's one catch. Congress failed us by adding a time limit and it's the only thing that is stopping history from being made.

For more than 100 years, we have shed blood, sweat, and tears to get to this point. And we never gave up. We won't give up now when we're this close.

#### bell hooks

Trailblazing feminist thinker and author bell hooks who is known for her work on sexuality, gender and race dies aged 69 after 'extended illness'

bell hooks, the groundbreaking author, educator and activist whose explorations intertwined race, gender, economics and politics, has died

The 69-year-old , who was one of the most influential thinkers of her time, died of an 'extended illness' according to the college she worked at



Starting in the 1970s, hooks' published dozens of books that helped shape popular and academic discourse

hooks was born Gloria Jean Watkins in 1952 in the segregated town of Hopkinsville, Kentucky, She later gave herself the pen name bell hooks in honor of her maternal great-grandmother Author Saeed Jones.




### **Remembering Sarah Weddington**

Sarah Weddington was a recent law school graduate when she met Norma McCorvey, better known as Jane Roe who was seeking an abortion in Texas. Weddington took on McCorvey's case and argued it all the way to the Supreme Court, where she was just 26 years old when she presented her arguments. They won. Sarah was elected to the Texas House of Representative for three terms. I She also served as an assistant to President Jimmy Carter. In later years Sarah taught law at the University of Texas-Austin and at Texas Women's University.
